Join a group from Centenary attending a performance of *I Do! I Do!* by Tom Jones and Harvey Schmidt at the Virginia Rep's Barksdale at Hanover Tavern (13181 Hanover Courthouse Road in Hanover). This intimate musical written by the creators of *The Fantasticks* follows two soul-mates as they navigate the joys and challenges of a 50 year marriage. Set to a tuneful, charming score, *I Do! I Do!* is a nostalgic and humorous rediscovery of romance. Tickets are around \$40 each.

NOTES FROM THE LAY LEADER

The following story may be familiar to some of you, but I urge you to read it prayerfully during this Lenten season and let it speak to your heart.

A wealthy man and his son loved to collect rare works of art. They had everything in their collection from Picasso to Raphael. They would often sit together and admire the great works of art. Sadly, the time came when the son was called to go to war. He was very courageous and died in battle while rescuing another soldier. The father was notified and grieved deeply for his only son.

About a month later, there was a knock at the door. A young man stood at the door with a large package in his hands. He said, "Sir, you don't know me, but I am the soldier for whom your son gave his life. He saved many lives that day, and he was carrying me to safety when a bullet struck him in the heart. He died instantly. He often talked about you and your love for art." The young man held out his package. "I'm not a great artist, but I think your son would have wanted you to have this."

The father opened the package. It was a portrait of his son, painted by the young man. He stared in awe at the way the young soldier had captured the personality of his son in the painting. His eyes welled up with tears. He thanked the young man and offered to pay him for the picture. "Oh, no sir, I could never repay what your son did for me. It's a gift." The father hung the portrait over his mantle. Every time visitors came to his home, he took them to see the portrait of his son before he showed them any of the great works of art he had collected.

Several months later the man died, and there was to be a great auction of his paintings. Many influential people gathered, excited about seeing the great paintings and having an opportunity to purchase one for their collections. On the platform sat the painting of the son. The auctioneer pounded his gavel. "We will start the bidding with this picture of the son." There was silence. Then a voice in the back of the room shouted, "We want to see the famous paintings. Skip this one." But the auctioneer persisted. "Who will start the bidding for this painting?" Another voice shouted angrily, "We didn't come to see this painting. We came to see the Van Goghs, the Rembrandts. Get on with the real bids." But still the auctioneer continued. "The son! Who will take the son?"

Finally, a voice came from the very back of the room. It was the longtime gardener of the man and his son. "I'll give you \$10 for the painting." Being a poor man, it was all he could afford. The auctioneer continued. "We have \$10. Who will bid \$20?" The crowd was becoming angry. They didn't want the portrait of the son. They wanted more worthy investments for their collections. The auctioneer pounded the gavel. "Going once, twice, sold for \$10!"

A man sitting on the second row shouted, "Now let's get on with the collection." The auctioneer laid down his gavel. "I'm sorry, the auction is over." Shouts came from all over the room. "But what about the paintings?" "When I was called to conduct this auction, I was told of a secret stipulation in the will. I was not allowed to reveal that stipulation until this time. Only the painting of the son would be auctioned. Whoever bought that painting would inherit the entire estate including the paintings. The man who took the son gets everything."

God gave his Son to die on a cruel cross. Much like the auctioneer, His message is "The Son, who will take the Son?" Whoever takes the Son gets everything. -John 3:16
